
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


FEEDBACK & EVALUTATIONS

Aviation has benefited from standardized checklists, simulation-based training, and a non-punitive error-reporting culture, leading to exceptional safety records.

In anaesthesia, crisis simulation, routine safety checks, and team communication protocols must be implemented just as rigorously to prevent complications and improve outcomes.
